



Dan Pratt is Professor Emeritus of Adult & Higher Education in the Department of Educational Studies at the University of British Columbia (UBC) and holds a cross appointment to the Faculty of Medicine (UBC) in the Centre for Health Education Scholarship. He was a faculty member for the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons Educators' Course (2004-11) and has been a core faculty member for the Harvard Macy Institute for the Health Professions since 2009. He has been a visiting professor and consultant at universities across North America, Europe, Asia, and Australia. His primary area of scholarship and academic interest is in teaching and learning.

In 1992 Professor Pratt received the highest award for teaching (The Killam Teaching Prize) at UBC. In 1999 his book, "Five Perspectives on Teaching in Adult and Higher Education", won the Cyril O. Houle Award for outstanding literature in adult education. In 2008 he received Canada's most prestigious university teaching award – the 3M National Teaching Fellowship. In 2011, Professor Pratt was inducted into the Adult and Continuing Education International Hall of Fame. And in 2012, Professors Pratt and Collins won the Imogene Okes Research/Scholarship Award for their work on the validity and reliability of the Teaching Perspectives Inventory (TPI). As of September 2015, more than 350,000 people have taken the TPI.
